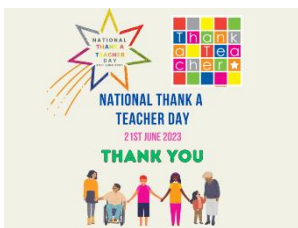


23rd June 2023

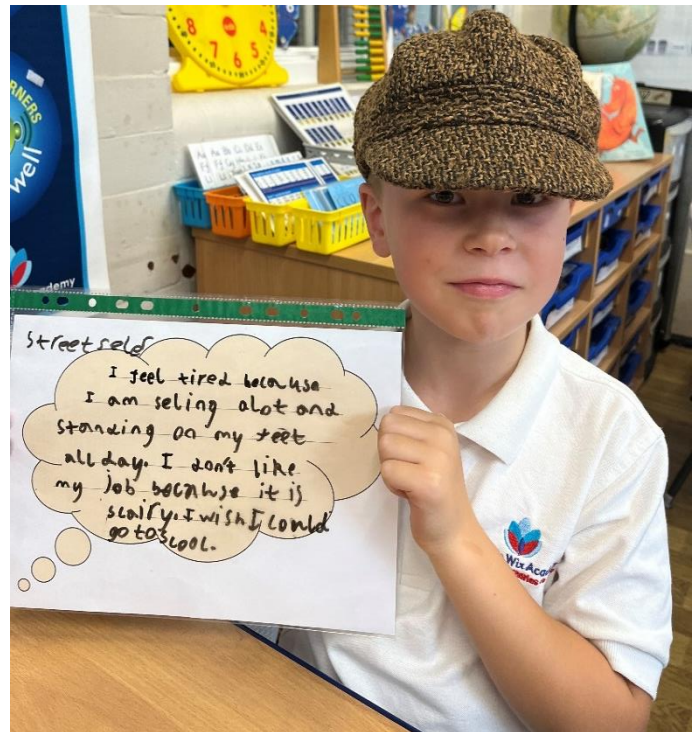


This week pupils in our Nursery have been doing more exploring of jungle animals. Every time I was in their class this week they were on safari – it was magical. They have thought carefully about the pattern on each animal and discussed whether the patterns were stripy, spotty or plain. Pupils used their fantastic creative skills to collage the matching pattern onto their chosen animal.

In RW pupils have been exploring the life cycle of plants. They planted some seeds in the garden and predicted what they would look like later on in the life cycle. Pupils explored the different trees around school and then created their own life cycle of a tree using photographs, drawings and labels.

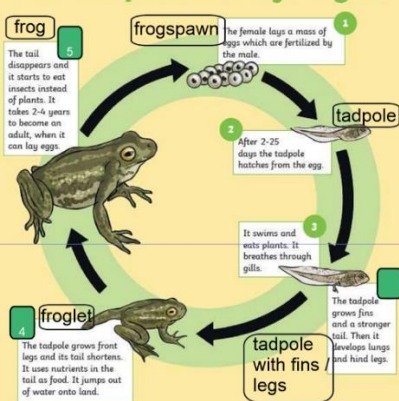
Pupils in our Year 1 class have been building on their knowledge of how the Victorian era was different to our lives now. They considered why many children from poor families went to work instead of school and explored some of the jobs they did. Pupils then chose one job and stepped into the shoes of a working Victorian child, considering their feelings and worries. Their outcomes were brilliant and very insightful.

This week, pupils in 1B have been looking at physical and human features in their Geography lesson. They explored different physical features on Clapham Common and human features along Clapham Old Town, using Google Earth.



Pupils in 2B have been reading Hansel and Gretel to inspire their own twisted fairy tale. They have started to plan an alternate setting to write our own version of Hansel and Gretel.

The Amphibian Life Cycle



Year 2 had a fun-filled Science lesson this week as they carried out a SOLE lesson using chromebooks to answer the Key Question: 'Do toads and frogs have the same life cycle?' Pupils got themselves organised in groups and allocated 'roles' to each other before carrying out research independently which they will present to the class next week. Year 2 were truly excellent learners as they showed they could work very responsibly in small groups.

This week in English, pupils in 3M have enjoyed learning and doing research about Mediterranean countries such as Italy, Greece and Croatia in preparation for writing their own Lonely Planet style travel guides. It has definitely put everyone in the mood for a holiday!



Year 4 had a fantastic afternoon on Wednesday exploring the wide variety of nature that is right on our doorstep in Clapham Common. Pupils used their Scientific Enquiry Skills to observe and identify different species of tree based on their leaves and branches, using keys to help them. They have been able to classify the trees in our local area.

Year 5's highlight this week was also during a science lesson. Pupils discussed changes in the human life cycle. They started by taking part in a teacher-edition baby photo quiz. Pupils loved this activity. They then explored the rate of baby growth, both prenatal and postnatal, and collected data to plot an accurate graph of baby development.

This week, Year 6 have been writing a narrative based around the short film, The Lucky Dip. It tells the tale of a young girl with a curious and arguably reckless mind who ventures into an abandoned arcade. It is what she finds there that is the biggest surprise of all!



During our staff meeting this week, Mr Butler held a training session for teachers in preparation for our Sports Days – doesn't it look like they had fun from the photograph above?

Teachers tried out the events that pupils will be competing in on their Sports Days. This had helped the teachers learn the rules and how to record scores on the day. Mr. Butler thinks they all really came because they wanted to train for the teacher's race which will be at the end of Sports Day!

Seana Henry, headteacher at Belleville Wix Academy talks about how she grew up admiring teachers, and then became one herself.

Generations of amazing teachers

My mum was a teacher at the primary school I went to as a child, I remember going to her classroom after the school day whilst she marked work, attended meetings or put up a display. I was always mesmerised by her stories about what happened in her and her colleagues' classrooms, but what really stood out was how much they cared for their pupils, especially those facing the most challenges.

Inspiration

Teachers continuously go above and beyond to meet the needs of the pupils in their care. We are very aware of the fact that the relationships we form with the children we teach impacts each pupil's individual outcome. My team and I are fans of a Ted Talk by the late Rita Pearson. Every time I watch it, I hear something new, but this is truly memorable:

"Every child deserves a champion—an adult who will never give up on them, who understands the power of connection, and insists that they become the best that they can possibly be."

Hearing parents and carers talk about how much they value their child's teacher is a very special part of my job. I know how happy teachers are when they hear how much the families value them. I also know that families genuinely value a great teacher who does all they can to ensure their child is happy and does whatever it takes to make sure the child is supported to develop a deep love of learning.
